### The Eddie Gilfoyle story

#### **Abstract**

If an appeal has been unsuccessful, an application may be made to the *Criminal Cases Review Commission* (CCRC) as occurred in Gilfoyle's cases, namely, *R v Gilfoyle*<sup>1</sup> [1996] 3 ALL ER 883 (powers of court to receive fresh evidence); and *R v Gilfoyle* <sup>2</sup>(CCRC reference regarding murder conviction). Unlike Stefan Kiszko's imprisonment for murder (see *R v Stefan Kiszko*, 18 February, 1992) which was finally quashed, Gilfoyle was unsuccessful at the Appeal Court, even though Michael Mansfield, QC, argued that crucial evidence was missing and other evidence, such as Mrs Gilfoyle's diaries<sup>3</sup> were withheld from the defence lawyers. <sup>4</sup> The diaries dated from Mrs Gilfoyle's teens to her 20s, allegedly reveal she took an overdose...
